- o **Drilling and Installation:** Use appropriate tools, such as carbide drill bits, to create a clean recess. Insert the box securely, ensuring stability and alignment with the wall surface .
- o **Compliance:** Maintain proper spacing and height according to electrical standards, especially in moisture-prone areas like bathrooms or kitchens .

- o **Hinged Artwork or Mirrors:** Mount a lightweight frame with hinges so it swings open without tools. Magnetic catches or small latches keep it flush against the wall .
